

## AMERICAN VETERANS CEREMONIAL URNS

At the end of our Memorial Service on Friday, November 2, 2018, an acceptance letter from the administrators of the Arizona Veterans Memorial Cemetery (Marana AZ) and the Southern Arizona Veterans Memorial Cemetery (Sierra Vista AZ) was read (see below). Ceremonial urns (similar to the ones described below) were donated to these two cemeteries on behalf of Everlasting Tree, the Sword family, and the 380th Bomb Group Association.

In 2009, Idaho artist John Sword and his wife Heidi started a small business creating and marketing unique, one-of-a-kind cremation urns. After experiencing the loss of several dear friends and family members, John and Heidi realized that there are limited choices for someone who wants to purchase a beautiful and unique cremation or memorial urn for a loved one. They quickly realized there is a real need and a promising market for these wonderful and unique cremation urns and keepsake memory boxes. This product serves a very special purpose at a time of great loss and sadness for many and has been enthusiastically received thus far.

The urns are donated to veterans' cemeteries and veterans' organizations where they are used during the ceremony for veterans or their families to honor their loved one.

The Arizona Veterans' Memorial Cemetery (AVMC-M) in Marana, Arizona and the Southern Arizona Veterans' Memorial Cemetery (SAVMC) in Sierra Vista, Arizona have each been a recipient of one of your "American Veterans Ceremonial Urn Covers." Joe Larson, the Administrator at SAVMC and I appreciate the donation and attest to the gratitude the families have expressed for their loved one's ceremony.

This urn is not only beautifully designed, it also has a special meaning for what it represents. The bronze leaf replica from Arlington is an honor and the sand or solid from a battlefield within the urn reminds us of the lives lost and those that fought so hard to defend our country. The Ceremonial Urn provides a more dignified committal service for the veteran.

A simple, standard, plastic box (urn) fits easily into the Ceremonial Urn and is easily removed for the cremated remains to be interred. We provide a copy of the picture and information card to each family that is offered the urn. The generosity and respect from 380<sup>th</sup> Bomb Group and Everlasting Tree Ceremonial Urns is greatly appreciated.

## HIDDEN TREASURES by JOLIE BERRIER

Both of my parents were of the "greatest generation": my mom worked in a bomber plant in Nebraska during the war and my dad was an Army Air Corps officer with the 442nd Troop Carrier Division, stationed in England and later France and Germany. In 2012, my elderly parents in California finally agreed to move from their house into assisted living. Mom was in hospice and Dad's memory was starting to falter. While moving furniture out of their home, my mother asked me to store and keep her father's WWI footlocker. When I asked about the contents she brushed my question aside and moved on to other issues. Eventually the foot locker was put on a truck, contents and all, and shipped to my home in Washington State.

Approximately six months later I decided to open the chest and examine its treasures. Little did I realize that doing so would allow me to create this narrative. Buried amongst the reams of sewing fabric were photos of a serviceman from WWII, as well as letters, maps, and photos of B-24s. Scanning the contents I learned that an airman who died in the war was a friend of my mother from the University of Nebraska, and that my mom researched the story of his loss nearly 50 years later. His name was Robert K. Oswald.

In early 2013 I visited my ailing mother; although weak from a lung infection, her mind was still quite sharp. Quietly I asked, "So who was Bob Oswald?" She realized I'd found the items in the trunk and promptly hung her head in a sheepish sort of way. My mom looked up and said, "Oh Bob; Bob could light up a room when he walked into it." She told me that Bob Oswald was a navigator on a B-24 that crashed in 1945 in Southeast Asia only a few months before the end of the war. One of the letters she received from her research indicated that Bob decided at the last minute to fly an extra mission (not with his normal crew) so that he could get home sooner to be with his sweetheart. I then asked Mom if she was Bob's sweetheart. "No," but I wish I had been" she replied wistfully. I asked no more questions knowing my mom was very tired and ill, and that I'd uncovered a private sadness in her past. This was the only opportunity I had to talk to my mother about Bob; a week later, she passed away.

By late 2015, my unconscious 94-year-old dad was in hospice so I was back in California sorting through paperwork and making decisions about my parents' belongings and his care. Going through his file cabinet I discovered a red folio with a big "N" on it. I was about to put it in the discard pile but something compelled me to open it. Inside it was a recent letter addressed to my mom from a graduate student at the University of Nebraska thanking her for the Robert K. Oswald Memorial Endowment Fund. In my weary state I suddenly remembered the old foot locker and its contents. My mother never told me about the scholarship and the thought crossed my mind that in my

mother's search for answers to Bob's passing, she took her sorrow and loss and used it for a good cause. And by doing so, she created a legacy for herself and for the memory of Robert K. Oswald. I don't know whether my dad ever knew of Bob Oswald or the scholarship that my mother created in his name; my dad passed away within the week of my finding the red folio.

This past year I've thoroughly examined the contents of the foot locker. I learned that my mother first began researching the loss of Bob Oswald in the late 1980's by writing to Tommy Thompson, then President of the Flying Circus Association. Mr. Thompson provided Glenn Horton Jr's address and Glenn in turn provided names and addresses of Bob's original flight crew; my mother apparently wrote to some of them. Beautiful letters received from Bob Oswald's fellow crewmembers Bob Lively and John Otto gave her insight into why Bob took that last and fateful mission. Her research included letters to and from the State Department and eventually led her to a grave marker in the Zachary Taylor National Cemetery in Louisville, Kentucky, where Bob Oswald was buried with other crew members who died alongside him. Apparently my mother actually went to Kentucky to a flag on his grave, as evident of the photo Bob's gravestone amongst her papers.

Robert K. Oswald was a Second Lieutenant with the 380th Bombardment Group, 5th Air Force Division. On June 12, 1945, he was reported missing in action over Saigon French Indochina after the B-24 he was navigating was shot down. In December 1945 he was reported dead and in April 1946 his parents in Aurora, Nebraska, received his posthumous Purple Heart. There is a plaque honoring his memory in Aurora, Nebraska, in addition to the one where he is buried in Louisville, Kentucky. Bob was 23 years old upon his death.

Without Glenn's initial help in connecting Bob's former crew members to my mother 25 years ago, there would probably be little record of Bob's life and passing. And had it not been for these few letters, photographs, and clues that my mother saved in her father's foot locker, I would never have known or been able to share this remarkable story. It's the story of Robert K. Oswald's sacrifice to our country and the lifelong regret over his loss that inspired my mother to learn more about him and honor him with a generously endowed scholarship at their alma mater – over 50 years after he died. This scholarship has never had a story behind it until now; I hope that every recipient of the Robert K. Oswald Memorial Endowment Scholarship at the University of Nebraska will now hear this story and give thanks to Bob for his service, and to my mother, for her admiration of Bob and her desire to honor him in this way.

## **HIDDEN TREASURES (continued)**

This is dedicated to the memory of Robert K. Oswald and all the members of the 380th Bombardment Group in WWII. These were young men who found, in themselves and in each other, the courage to fly in the thin blue skies halfway around the world to fight for the homeland they loved. America can forever be proud of their contribution to the cause of freedom.

Jolie Berrier is the daughter of Ellen Berrier; Ellen was a friend of Bob Oswald in college and who later researched his combat missions and subsequent death along with the help of Glenn Horton, Jr.

## A SECOND CHANCE: WWII TAIL GUNNER FEELS CALLED TO HELP OTHER VETERANS

Solon L. Graham, Pilot, Hill's Crew, 528th Squadron, of Clarksburg, Ohio, recently sent in an article he found in the 2018 Veteran's Day issue of THE COLUMBUS DISPATCH. He says in his cover letter:

Greetings from one of your OLD buddies in The Flying Circus." I'm 96 now, so my airspeed and altitude are slow and low, but under control for the time being....Thank the Good Lord.

I am sending you in this interesting article that appeared in The Columbus Dispatch ... in the Veteran's Day edition, Sunday, November 11.

Here is a gentleman, Dick Wood, not quite my age, at 93 ... that I have never met or even knew about. It was such a totally surprising line to read that he was in the 380th Bombardment Group, 528th Squadron. I couldn't believe it!! I think you and the rest of this distinguished band will find his "Second Chance" story really worthwhile.

It was supposed to be a special afternoon, a shared experience, when Dick Wood could show his young grandson around the museum and tell him some stories about what it was like to be a tail gunner on a B-24 bomber during World War II.

As they stood there that long-ago day inside the National Museum of the U.S. Air Force in Dayton and studied a plane just like the one on which Wood flew, one of the men who had been working on the aircraft overheard Wood reminiscing. He asked the veteran if he'd like to climb inside. Wood jumped at the chance.

He recalled what happened next, and he choked up. As he spoke of that afternoon and his eyes filled with tears, it is clear his mind is no longer in his Dublin living room but somewhere else, someplace far away.

"I got inside and my head came up in that bomb bay ..." he paused. "My God, the cordite. I could smell it. The anti-aircraft fire. I could hear it ..."

#### He collected himself.

"The man standing there knew right away what was happening and he got me out of there," Wood said. At the time, he was embarrassed. The 93-year-old now knows there was no reason to be.

"When you know people died because of what you've done, it's an awful thing, even when the mission is honorable and it has to be done," he said. "What happens in a war is you become uncivil. And you bury that. The damage of it surfaces in strange ways."

## **Saving lives**

As CEO of Save A Warrior — a nonprofit "war detox" organization that runs a healing retreat for veterans and first responders in rural Licking County — Keith Ritz knows a thing or two about war and its aftermath. And yet, when he met Wood not that long ago, he knew the veteran had much to teach him.

You see, after the military, Wood spent a career as a successful salesman and then business owner. Until the 1980s came along, anyhow. That's when he went through a two-year program to study spiritual guidance and then began a 20-year, second career of counseling those dealing with trauma for free. It was through those years of volunteering to help others (not veterans, specifically, it was mostly people battling addiction) that he came to learn about post-traumatic stress disorder.

Looking back at his own military service, Wood realized that he had suffered, too. He speaks of how his professors at Ohio State University noticed that he couldn't focus in class after returning home from war, and he talks of how he mended by spending a summer at a favorite aunt and uncle's farm in the rolling hills of rural Ross County.

There, he slept under the stars and helped tend to the wheat fields along the banks of Paint Creek. There, he and his uncle would sometimes sit quietly on the porch, each man lost in his own thoughts. There, sometimes they would read poetry together, using the serenity of it all to flush out the remnants of war that Wood didn't even realize were hidden inside him.

That time, Wood said, was both healing and transformational. And so it was with equal parts awe and emotion that he read a story about Save A Warrior a few months ago in The Dispatch.

He called an old friend — a quiet philanthropist who believes in anonymously improving the world by helping one person at a time — and told him of this program. And now, Wood's friend has given \$250,000 to the organization. Coupled with matching donations, it will help free the organization from the mortgage on the 47 acres in Newark, allowing more funds to be used to help more veterans.

"Dick Wood saw us and understood what we did. This donation means that we can save so many more lives," Ritz said. "And that's all because Dick Wood read a story in The Dispatch and was moved to help."

#### **Another chance**

Not long after he graduated from Columbus's North High School in February 1944, Wood found himself bound for Air Force basic training. With anger in his heart that had simmered ever since the attack on Pearl Harbor two years before, he enlisted because he wanted to honor and protect the country that he so loved.

Quickly, he was in the thick of things. A spot had opened up with an Army Air crew on a B-24 Liberator and they needed a tail gunner immediately.

"Next thing you know, I was 19 years old and on a plane on my way to New Guinea," he said. "I was off and running."

Wood flew 47 combat missions as part of the 380th
Bombardment Group's 528th
Squadron, mostly as part of what was known as Gen. Douglas MacArthur's "island-hopping" strategy, in which the Allied Forces targeted South Pacific islands that were not as heavily defended by the Japanese.

But after his role in the war was over, a moment came that would change him forever. Headed back to the States in late 1945 or early '46 (troops were rushed off the Okinawa islands in a hurry following a devastating typhoon), Wood and his comrades were aboard a B-24 headed for Hawaii. After the plane refueled in Guam, though, something went terribly wrong. An engine blew, and the plane lost altitude fast.

"We all looked at one another and thought, 'My God, after what we've all been through, now, when we are finally going home, this is it?" Wood recalled. "We were prepared to die."

The navigator spotted a coral reef below, and told the men they were going to try to crash-land there. They did, and it turned out to be Johnston Atoll, which held a Navy submarine refueling base. Their plane was repaired there, and all the men aboard eventually came on home.

Wood knew the day of the crash, however, that for some reason, he'd been given another chance. He was going to make the most of it somehow. He knew then that he was going to try to make a difference in others' lives.

And so he did. These days, he remains grateful for a life well lived, he says, and does what he can to make sure veterans are remembered and cared for.

He spent 63 glorious years with the love of his life, Margaret, before losing her in April 2013. Their three children, six grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren keep him young, he says — well, their company coupled with the hourlong workout he gets in at 6 every morning, the fruit smoothies he makes each day for good health, the painting classes he recently undertook to keep his mind sharp and his daily afternoon meditation to soothe his soul.

He tells stories of his service when he can — a week ago he spent a few hours at a Veterans Day program at an Upper Arlington middle school — and he honors fallen comrades at remembrance services whenever he gets the chance. He hopes it all is enough.

"God's been good to me," he said. "I felt called to help others, and I've tried to do that."
