THEN AND NOW

The following biographical sketch of Horace Eisenhard was prepared for the Veterans Recognition Project of the Lower Macungie Township Historical Society in Lehigh County, PA.

Horace Paul Eisenhard Staff Sergeant U. S. Army Air Force 8 December 1942 – 21 October 1945 531st Squadron, 380th Bomb Group Gunner, Cook's and Koller's Crews

Horace was born at home on 17 April 1922 on Quarry Road in Lower Macungie Township, Pennsylvania to **George Washington Daniel Eisenhard** (27 Dec 1902 – 17 Jun 1954) and **Susan M. Danko** (6 June 1901 – 8 May 1985). After attending grade school in Alburtis, Pennsylvania, from 1928 to 1937, Horace worked for his father hauling, bagging and delivering coal from their home on Quarry Road. In 1939, Horace went to work for Lehigh Slag Company in Alburtis as a truck driver until 1940, and then for Traylor Engineering Company in Allentown, Pennsylvania, as an assembler and welder until he entered the Army.

Horace was drafted into the Army as a Private on 8 December 1942. After he was inducted at New Cumberland, Pennsylvania, he was ordered to Camp McCoy, Wisconsin, for basic training and was then assigned to the 2nd Infantry Division. After a 15-day furlough in June 1943, during which his daughter **Gloria Jean** was born, Horace reported in at Fort Custer, Michigan, for a short while before being transferred to Baco Raton, Florida, where he drove refueling trucks for C-47, B-24, and B-17 aircraft. He then was reassigned to Scott Field in Illinois, where he attended Radio Operator School. On 14 September 1944, he was transferred to Harlington, Texas, for five weeks for Aerial Gunnery School, and then to March Field near Riverside,

California, for crew training on the B-24 "Liberator" Heavy Bomber as a Turret Gunner until February 1945. His next assignment was at Hamilton Field near San Francisco, California, where he was assigned to an air crew and ordered to deliver his airplane to the Far East Air Forces (later re-designated 5th Air Force) Combat and Training Center on Berokoe Drome, Biak, a small island near the northern coast of Papua, Indonesia. From there Horace flew B-24 bombing missions as a Lower Ball Gunner in the 531st Squadron, 380th Bombardment Group ("The Flying Circus"), bombing oil fields on Borneo, and later from Mindoro in the Philippines to bomb targets on Formosa. The 380th distinguished itself by flying 10-12 hour missions - the longest bombing missions of the war. Horace served in the Pacific Theater from 18 April 1945 until 9 October 1945, when he returned to the States for separation at Camp Atterbury, Indiana, on 21 October 1945. He was discharged there as a Staff Sergeant and was awarded the Air Medal, the Asiatic-Pacific Theater Medal (w/5 bronze stars), and the Philippine Liberation Medal.

Horace then returned to Trexlertown, Pennsylvania, and resumed working for Traylor Engineering until 1947, when he went to work for Nothstein Excavating & Trucking Company in Trexlertown, Pennsylvania, as an Equipment Operator until he retired in 1986.

Horace married **Geraldine May Nothstein** (born 21 May 1923) on 13 December 1942 in St. Paul's Union Lutheran Church in Trexlertown. They lived with Geraldine's parents until 1947, and then moved to Brookside Road in Wescosville. In 1967, they moved to Breinigsville, Pennsylvania, and in 2003 relocated to Bushkill Township Pennsylvania. In addition to their daughter, Horace and Geraldine had a son, **Eric Paul**. Horace is a life member of VFW 8282 in Breinigsville; Wescosville Fire Company; and Rural Sportsmen's Association in Trexlertown. He also has been a member of Masonic Lodge 326 since 1968.

Both in their mid 80s, Horace and Geraldine are in good health, though she requires a wheelchair.

LONG AGO AND FAR AWAY

The picture John Collins and I are holding was my dad's Combat Training Crew picture taken at the Army Air Base Training Center in Pueblo, Colorado in 1943. Dad and his entire 528th B.S. crew came together for the first time in Pueblo to start their training as a crew before leaving for Australia to be assigned to the 380th B.G.

Barb Gotham from the 380th B.G. Association sent an email to me she received from a TSgt. John Collins, stationed at Edwards Air Force Base in California. John had dad's crew picture hanging on his office wall.

John Collins is originally from Texas. John's mother had bought an old suitcase at a garage sale over 30 years ago. She was told that in the



case were old picture frames. She took it home, never opened it and placed in their garage. Several years ago John's dad decided to open it up and lo and behold there was dad's Combat Training Crew picture along with other old picture frames. On the back of the picture, the entire crew names were listed. John's dad gave the picture to him and John decided the mystery picture was to hang on his office wall at Edwards Air Force Base.

John, after many years of wondering who the men were in the picture decided to surf the Internet for bomb groups to find an answer. He found the 380th B.G. Association website. He read some of the articles I had submitted and found the men's names listed corresponded with the names on the back of his picture. He noticed from one of my articles there was a different name for the navigator than what he had on his picture. John was curious about the two different names and who had originally owned the picture. John emailed Barb Gotham and Barb sent John's information to me. I was in total shock when I saw dad's combat crew picture.

I emailed John Collins in California to tell him who I was and that I could answer his questions about the picture. The two different navigators were Lt. Quinton V. Tuttle, the original navigator who somehow got their crew lost on their first two missions out of Fenton, so the command pilot, Lt. John S. DiDomenico, decided to make a change and brought Lt. John H. Reid on board as their new navigator. John's other question of who discarded the picture most likely was Mrs. Thomas Murphy who lived in the Dallas, Texas area. Thomas Murphy, her late husband, better known as "Pappy," was a gunner and oldest member of the crew. John Collins's mother could not recall from whom or where she bought the suitcase from after so many years. Just to be on the safe side, I asked Lucile Miller, the wife of the late John Miller (John was the radio operator on dad's crew) from Fort Worth about this picture. Mrs. Miller told me they had lost most of John's W.W.II pictures in Fort Worth's flood in1946. I am convinced now that Mrs. Thomas Murphy had sold the picture to John Collins's mother as Thomas Murphy and John Miller were the only two members from dad's crew living in the Dallas/Fort Worth area.

TSgt. John Collins told me he would be coming to the Fort Worth area for schooling the last week in January. I invited him to dinner. John and his dad met my son and me at a restaurant to meet for the first time and look over all the information we had on the picture. John offered to give me back the picture his mother bought, but I told him I had several of that specific one and he was welcomed to keep it. John was hoping I would say that as he now has a story behind the picture he will take back to his office in California to hang back up on the wall.

WHEN ADELAIDE WAS BOMBED BY ORANGES

Excerpts taken from an issue of W.W.II magazine Submitted by Bill Bever

During the 380th Bomb Group stay in Australia, the various bomb squadrons had to make supply runs to feed their airman and ground crews. Thus came about "the bombing of Adelaide," an episode attributed to a Liberator bomber carrying various items in its bomb bays oranges, booze, Coca Cola and so on. As luck would have it, the bomb bay doors "peeled off shortly after takeoff And gravity took care of the rest. Quite a sight it was to see case after case tumbling down, plus crates of oranges flying apart," recalled American Charles Edward of the 380th Bombardment Group.

Below, a crate of beer landed in Mrs. I.F. MacDonald's back yard and a Coke carton "demolished" the roof of her washhouse. Oranges "showered down over the entire neighborhood." Amazingly, no one was hurt.

The 380th did not win a Presidential Unit Citation for this feat, but did win one for its lengthy missions over the Dutch East Indies, including the war's longest bombing raid before the advent of the B-29 "Super Fort." Operating the B-24 Liberator, the 380th lost 49 of its bombers in one year, and more then 260 men overall, before decamping from the Northern Territory No longer the vulnerable Northern Territory exactly because of such sacrifices by American, Australians and their various allies in the <u>down under part of the</u> world.
