

A72-176, the B-24M Liberator renovated by the B-24 Liberator Memorial Restoration Fund, Inc., represents 10 years of effort by a group of Australian WWII Air Force Veterans and their younger compatriots. This plane has grown from a pile of corroded parts to a complete, recognizable aircraft. However, much work still remains to the done, since the group vows to produce an aircraft that could be flyable, but at the same time, promise it never will be flown because of its historical value.

While externally relatively complete, the plane is a shell, i.e., there are effectively no internal furnishings (equipment, hydraulics, controls, internal electrical wiring, etc.). Much of the necessary equipment is on-hand, and industrial firms have promised to supply the electrical wiring and hydraulic systems. Thus an additional two years is forecast before a truly complete aircraft has been obtained.

In addition, the Fund will soon lose its current home, the old hangar at Werribee. Plans are in place to build a new hangar at Avalon Airport nearby. Upon completion, this hangar will become a museum housing A72-176 and other B-24 related artifacts. Approximately \$1,000,000.00 in new funding is needed to complete the task (build the hangar and finish the plane).

The Anthem for the Dedication Ceremony -- see next page -- was universally acclaimed by the audience and promoted as the theme song for the Liberator Squadrons of Australia organization. We have a copy of the relevant music.

Cross your heart, cross your fingers, and swallow your fear.


SOME PICTURES OF THE PLANE


My camera's flash was too weak to catch a complete dark airplane in a dark hangar. Thus available pictures are only closeups of sections of the plane.



The tail section showing right rudder completed but left still needing fabric covering. The tail turret is completed but still needs glazing and mounting.


The nose turret is complete, but must be reglazed and mounted. The bombardier's enclosure also must be fabricated.





The engines are mounted but all accessories and controls must be added. Two engines must still be overhauled. One of these is seized. Cowlings need to be fabricated.

Note installation of oil tank. As shown here, nacelles and cowling need to be added as well as all internal accessories and controls.



WHAT DO WE DO IN 2001?

The past year has shown us that the 380th Bomb Group Association has indeed proven its viability. We therefore must plan for our future – including our coming reunions after San Antonio.

In continuing the theme of our current reunion at San Antonio, we would suggest consideration of the following sites for their sightseeing and military reunion possibilities:

- 1. Williamsburg, VA, with the Memorial Service to be held at Langley AFB. Other attractions beyond Colonial Williamsburg would include the Virginia Air and Space Center at Hampton (which has 1/2 of a B-24) and perhaps a Navy visit.
- 2. Salt Lake City, UT, with the Memorial Service to be held at Hill AFB in Ogden. The Hill Aerospace Museum is renovating a B-24D, which crashed in the Aleutians. A trip to Wendover where many of our people plus the Atomic Bomb Project trained would be interesting as well as Salt Lake, the Wasatch Range, and other sightseeing in the area.
- 3. Rapid City, SD, with the Memorial Service at Ellsworth AFB. Attractions would be the "Faces"; Deadwood, Lead and other Wild West Mining Towns; the Buffalo Herd at Wind Cave National Park; the Bad Lands, etc.
- 4. Colorado Springs, CO, with the Memorial Service at the AF Academy. We should try for a home game football weekend and attendance at the game. The 380th has a memorial plaque on the Memorial Walk. A trip to the B-24 Memorial Museum in Pueblo may be possible.
- 5. Fort Walton Beach, FL, with the Memorial Service at Eglin AFB. The Air Force Armament Museum would be an important attraction, and maybe a Firepower Demonstration, which Eglin holds periodically, plus, of course, the beach.

During discussions of our future at the Tucson reunion last year, the following additional sites were suggested:

- 6. St. Louis, MO, with the Memorial Service to be held at Scott AFB. St. Louis has many attractions with the Arch, the Gateway to the West Museum, Forest Park with its Museums, Zoo, and Botanical Gardens.
- 7. Dayton, OH, with Memorial Services at Wright-Patterson AFB. The attraction here is the Air Force Museum, the largest and best in the world. We have a plaque in their memorial park.

Please think about your preferences and discuss them with your associates at San Antonio. This will be the major topic of discussion at the Members Meeting on Saturday afternoon, November 11th, at San Antonio. Other potential sites can be discussed as well.
