Native American Code Talkers Congressional Gold Medals -- Hopi Tribe

Obverse

Designer: Joel Iskowitz Engraver: Don Everhart

The obverse design features Hopi code talkers communicating on a field phone and using binoculars to search for the enemy. The B-24 Liberator in the background represents the Hopi code talkers' service in the 90th and 380th Bombardment Groups. Inscriptions are HOPI CODE TALKERS and U.S. ARMY.

Reverse

Designer: Joel Iskowitz Engraver: Renata Gordon

The reverse design features a variation of the Hopi Tribe flag, which depicts a circle with dots, mountains and stalks of corn on both sides of the mountains. The flag's symbols represent the Hopi way of life. Inscriptions are WORLD WAR II, ACT OF CONGRESS 2008, A CODE NEVER BROKEN, KEPT AMERICA FREE and HOPILAVAYI, which in English means "Hopi language."

VETERAN'S HISTORY PROJECT: EDWARDS HENRY

Edwards Henry grew up in Pontotoc County. He was working at a grocery store in Canton when he decided to join the military.

"In July of '42, they came out with a program called CPT, which was civilian pilot training. The purpose of it was to train civilian pilots to deliver planes from the different manufacturers to the service. And I was able to make it into CPT.

From there though, instead of sending me on to the next step to deliver the airplane, they put me in training as a glider pilot," said Henry.

He went on to train as an air force cadet.

"I was preparing myself to go to war... when we were finally sent to Australia.

When we lined up, and got ready for take off... Of course my job was to get cleared from the tower... and the tower man said '190, you are cleared for take-off. Goodbye and good luck.' And if I could cut off the engine then... I realized where I was headed. So I think I became a man that night.

Well, I thought the more engines I had, the better chance I had of coming home. So I was assigned to B24's," said Henry.

Many of their missions were designed to disrupt the shipping of Japanese supplies.

"We flew usually with 100 pound bombs. And we'd usually take 10-12 bombs with us.

We shot down some fighters on some of our missions," he said.

He remembers one exchange with the Japanese - when he was sure he was done for.

"The Japanese gunners had attacked us and of course.. When our top turret gunner opened up, the fighter was coming in and he was shooting. And the plane would shake when those guns would open up. And something hit me on the head. And I was looking at that fighter coming in and I just knew I had been hit," said Henry.

It turned out to be a light bulb, knocked loose by the shaking from the guns.

"And that light came loose and we finally found it on the floor. But I knew I'd been shot. I knew it," said Henry.

The Japanese occupied the islands off the northern Australian coast. It wasn't until later the 380th bomber group would lend air support to soldiers on the ground.

"The soldiers, we never did give them support until we moved to the Philippines," said Henry.

It was just when Henry and his men were headed to the Philippines, he experienced his most frightening moment in the air. His commanding officer was flying the plane.

"We took off and after we had been up about an hour or two, I could see a cloud in front of us. It looked pretty bad when I first saw it, but the closer we got the worse it looked. It was some kind of a storm. We hadn't been in it very long until the leading edge of our wing had St. Elmo's Fire at least that wide all the way across the wing on both sides. The tip of the propellers all had St. Elmo's Fire. The further we went in, the worse it got. I've never been in anything like that. It was the scariest flight that I made," said Henry.

In all, Henry flew 42 combat missions. After he had enough points, he returned home. One week after he left the service, he married his sweetheart. The allies dropped the atomic bomb while he was on his honeymoon.

My name is Judith Gilbert and I am the Secretary of the B-24 Liberator Memorial Restoration Fund located at Werribee in Victoria.

The Fund is restoring a WW2 bomber, the Liberator. All work is done by volunteers who are working to keep a valuable part of Australia's wartime aviation history accessible to the public.

The Fund is in the process of negotiation with the State Government, Places Victoria and Melbourne Water for a permanent home for the restoration and needs help to show these parties the value of maintaining the restoration at its present location: in Hangar 2, a heritage hangar in situ on the heritage land surrounding it.

Facts about the project:

Hangar is open to the public 3 days a week and averages just over 3000 visitors a year mostly from Victoria but also large interstate numbers and several from overseas.

Some 40 volunteers work regularly on the restoration.

This is the only Liberator left in the Southern Hemisphere, one of only 7 worldwide. The Liberator was the aircraft that helped prevent invasion of Australia during WW2.

The Fund has a high public profile and recently won the Wyndham Tourism Business of the Year Award.

The hangar is seen as focal point for Liberator veterans and annually hosts the combined Liberator Squadrons' Reunion for veterans & their families.

The Fund operates with no outside financial assistance, has never overspent its budget and has managed to put aside some funds in an investment account for future expenditure.


Liberator pilots trained at Tocumwal NSW but initial flight training was carried out at places like Werribee Field where the young recruits were taught to fly. There is Heritage listing on our site. We feel that this connection between the various aspects of training is of value and the link should be maintained.

Judith,

My name is Steve Conway, and I was forwarded your email requesting support for the B-24 Memorial in Australia by Barbara Gotham of the 380th Bomb Group Association.

My father, Francis Richard Conway was a co-pilot in the 529th Bomb Squadron, of the 380th Bomb Group, of the 5th US Army Air Corps. He flew in combat out of multiple locations in the Northern Territories to help the effort against the Japanese. He served his country faithfully during his time in the Air Corp and had many harrowing missions as testified to in his pilot's log which I inherited. He was shot down once on New Year's Eve 1943 and crash landed at Gusup Air Strip in New Guinea. After recovering from his wounds he went back to flying missions until the end of his tour of duty. Over his service in Australia he was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross, Air Medal with Oak Leaf Clusters, and the Purple Heart.

He spoke infrequently about his service in WWII, but when he did he was proud to have served in Australia, and at one point turned down his own command (requiring a transfer to another area) in order to stay there. He was only 22 years old when he started flying combat missions, and the memories of those, both good and bad help shape the rest of his life. He went on to serve on the St. Paul Fire Department (in Minnesota), built our home on the east side, attended mass regularly and volunteered his time to help others. The values of family, faith, service to others were strongly reinforced during his service and he never wavered from those the rest of his life.

The effort to create/sustain a memorial to all of those who served with the Liberators in Australia is a commitment to honor the dedication, sacrifices, and lives of those in the USAAF and the RAAF who were so devoted winning the war and protecting the lives and sovereignty of the countries they fought and died to protect. It also is a tangible site which would allow ours and future generations to see, hear and touch the equipment and sense the history and memories of what was accomplished there.

Thank you for the opportunity to offer my support to you and your group in the effort.



July 25, 2013

My father was a bomber pilot in World War II. I have waited way too long to search for information on what he actually did in the war. Next week I'm vacationing with my 5 children. I decided to bring along some family memorabilia. Among the items were a few references to my father and his service in the 380th Bombardment Group.

According to family stories, my father enlisted in the Army Air Corp sometime after the United States went to war in 1941. He was assigned to a base somewhere in the Southern states, and later became a trainer for pilots. He eventually went to the Pacific war theater. Dad once told me he was in the first group of married men who went through pilot training. According to him, they were the first bunch of trainees to get through training with no fatalities.

In his personal files, which I received after his death in 1989, I found old photographs of bombers which were painted with the names "Big Time Operator", "Bugs Bunny" and "Senator". I do not know if my father actually flew in any of these planes. A photocopy of a list of names and addresses titled "NEW MEMBERS - 6 September - 7 December 1983", includes my father's name and his last address in Myrtle Beach, SC. Also listed on the page for "Havner's Crew" are Francis Bailey, Engineer; James Barber, Gunner; Charles Gibson, Gunner; Herbert Johnston, Gunner; Harry Lewellen, Gunner; Clark Morehouse, Co-Pilot.

My father never spoke to me about his World War II experiences. My 3 older sisters have never shared anything he may have told them about what he did and where he travelled outside the United States during the war. My oldest sister was born in 1939 and does remember moving to the South with our mother and her younger sister to be with Dad at the training base.

NOTE: My interest in checking up on what my dad did during the war has been sparked by a friendship with a man who was a rear gunner in a bomber, which flew out of England in WW II. The man just turned 90. His wife has been doing a quarterly newsletter for his wartime group for several years. She said there will be only 2 more issues, "...because everyone is dying." I'm hoping I'm not too late to find out some firsthand information on my father's WW II activities.


November 2013






