



THE NATIONAL WWII MUSEUM, NEW ORLEANS

Barb Gotham was in New Orleans in December 2014 and visited the National WWII Museum.

Shown here is a photo of the 380th commemorative brick at the museum.

Our brick can be found at NF 23 (rows down) 18 (bricks over) on Magazine Street (see map).

Here's what's new at the museum since our reunion group visited in 2012:

In January 2013, the museum opened the *US Freedom Pavilion: The Boeing Center,* which celebrates the extraordinary spirit of teamwork, sacrifice, and ingenuity demonstrated by Americans in battle and on the Home Front, as well America's legendary production of airplanes, artillery, tanks, and other equipment that helped achieve victory.

Final Mission: The USS Tang Submarine Experience places visitors aboard the most successful submarine in World War II for its fifth and final war patrol on 25 October 1944 to relive the last epic battle of the USS Tang. Each guest receives a "watch bill" representing a specific Tang crewmember and many will be "enlisted" to perform specific tasks to navigate through the battle. [During Barb's "mission," she got to fire the torpedos!]

Most recently in December 2014, Road to Berlin: European Theater Galleries opened in the brand new Campaigns of Courage: European and Pacific Theaters pavilion. Expansive in its scope, exhaustive in its detail, and captivating in its innovative design, Road to Berlin is a whole new way to understand America's story of the war in Europe, Africa, and the Mediterranean. [The grand opening was unfortunately the day after Barb's visit!]

This newest pavilion of The National WWII Museum brings to life the drama, sacrifices, personal stories, and strategies of America's campaign to defeat the Axis powers and preserve freedom. Dramatic exhibits explore how the United States' citizen soldiers and their Allies secured victory in the 20th Century's titanic struggle—a fight for civilization itself.


The heart of the museum experience, *Campaigns of Courage: European and Pacific Theaters*—a 32,000 square foot pavilion—brings visitors inside the story of how the war was won. The Pavilion features two immersive exhibitions— *Road to Berlin: European Theater Galleries*, now open, and *Road to Tokyo: Pacific Theater Galleries*, opening in 2015.

Up next at the museum:

The museum is currently finishing the design of and building out exhibits in the next pavilion *Campaigns of Courage: European and Pacific Theaters.* This pavilion will take visitors on a deep dive into the heart of battles, strategy, and leadership of the war in Europe and the war in the Pacific. After *Campaigns of Courage* opens, the museum will focus its energy on the *Liberation Pavilion*, which will educate the public about postwar history and what the war means today — a critical component of the museum's core mission. Meanwhile, the museum will rebuild and expand its current Home Front exhibit to tell the complete story of America's journey to war and action on American soil during the war years, including the formidable Arsenal of Democracy.


RESEARCH INFORMATION

For those of you doing research on WWII veterans, here's a couple of resources:

Requesting military personnel records? Check out the National Archives at: Military Personnel Records, 9700 Page Ave., St. Louis, MO, 63132-5100 USA (their website is: http://vetrecs.archives.gov, where you can request records online). You will need to include certain information in the request, such as Social Sec # or the vet's service Serial Number, dates of service, and other info (which is listed on the website). You may have to ask more than once (some records were lost in flooding or a fire) - others in our group have said that they've had to ask two or three times for info before they actually got what they were seeking.

If you're looking for information on a particular mission accident report, check out: Accident-Report.com (Note that there is a charge for their reports.) Accident Reports, 1322 West Main Street, Millville, New Jersey 08332 USA

Accident Reports is also looking for AAF pilot training documents. They offer discounts for scans of certain World War II-era AAF pilot training documents and orders, especially those containing lists of names.










From the back cover of the book:

Born and raised in Sydney, Dick Dakeyne survived 48 missions and 500 hours flying over Japanese enemy territory during World War Two, both as a gunner and radar countermeasures operator. Most of his service was spent living and flying with US Army Air Force bomb squadrons based at Fenton airstrip 140 kilometres south of Darwin in the Northern Territory of Australia. Dick's account describes living with the Americans and flying in B-24 Liberator long-range heavy bombers, on record-breaking missions lasting up to 16 hours. Death surrounded him, with the loss of fellow servicemen from Japanese ack-ack (anti-aircraft) guns, machine gun fire from enemy planes, and bombing raids on northern Australia

For his military service and bravery, Dick was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross from Australia.

From the Introduction to the book:


This is a story of Houston Stephen Burkhart, my father, and his life in and around World War II. He never talked about the war and none of us ever asked.

I decided to collect his photos and World War II documents and give copies to his grandchildren for Christmas, six weeks away. I would have met the deadline had I not stopped to actually read the documents, but I did, and found I did not know what most of them meant. The project grew into what became this book.

July 31, 1944

Dear Mother & Dad,

My last letter was held up in New Guinea because of censor trouble. If you've gotten the letter at all, you probably noticed the holes in it. They didn't like the idea of me naming the airfield.

About all I'm able to tell you is that we've completed our training in New Guinea and have been permanently assigned to a squadron "somewhere in Australia."

Our field in Australia is a great improvement over the field in New Guinea. The food here is almost fit to eat. At Guinea, officers, enlisted men, pigs and dogs all ate the same tomained chow. The climate isn't as wet here and the mosquiroes aren't as bad. In New Guinea, we were forced to take atabrine everyday to prevent malaria. The flight suggeon said we could stop taking it after two mouths here. Atabrine is a substitute for quinine and when taken for a long period, the skin turns yellow. I think there are more yellow men in our Army than in



Ed and his daughter, Jennifer, at the 2014 reunion Ed Walford served as a B-24J navigator under Captain Lyle Sears with the 380th Bomb Group in the 531st squadron. Those experiences formed his character and Ed always had a goal to publish a memoir about those days. Ed realized this dream with the release of his memoir, Letters to Home During World War II: A Son's Journey.

More than 70 years later, Ed's detailed letters and photos that his mother, Rosina, diligently saved is now a unique memoir of a young man's personal narrative about the people, places, and experiences during military training and then assignment to Darwin, Australia and Mindoro Island, Philippines during World War II.

Letters to Home During World War II was first available at the 380th Bomb Group's 2014 reunion in November. For those members unable to attend the reunion, the 200-page memoir of Ed's letters and personal photos detailing the experiences from basic training through the end of the war is available for \$35 plus \$5 for mailing. Beautifully produced as a largeformat coffee table book, this private edition of Ed's memoir is only available to members of the 380th Bomb Group and to Ed's family and friends.

HISTORY PROJECT UPDATE

Barb Gotham received the remainder of the WE WENT TO WAR history project documents (from Ted Williams' family) last year. Among these are mission documents and maps.

Barb is currently creating mission lists for each crew. The current online history project shows the mission lists for each aircraft, but not by individual pilots. Once these are complete, they will be added to the List of Aircraft Commanders page on our website (http://380th.org/HISTORY/AcftCmdrList-all.htm). In the meantime, if you'd like a particular crew's mission list, please send email to 380th.ww2@gmail.com, and provide the veteran's or pilot's name.

The next 380th project (after the missions list for each crew) is scanning the mission record documents and maps.

Eventually, the goal is to post on our website (http://380th.org/HISTORY/History.html) the mission record documents associated with each mission # on each crew's missions list, as well as a separate section on each mission (the mission documents, maps, and possibly even narratives). Unfortunately, no date can be given for completion due to the large amount of data to be scanned and transferred to the website.

DARWIN BOMBING WEBSITE

Miles Peg NT is a website that aims to gather together stories, photos, recollections and maps of World War 2 sites along the Stuart Highway in the Northern Territory, Australia. The purpose is to present and thus preserve a picture of what life was like for the Allied Servicemen and women that served at these sites following the bombing of Darwin on the 19th of February 1942. As such, this site will be dependent on contributions from people willing to share such information to be displayed on the site and will therefore be a continual work in progress.

The bombing of Darwin on the 19th of February 1942 is historically a very important date in the history of the Northern Territory. As such it commands a considerable amount of attention by the media and in other publications. The bombing on the 19th, however, was not the end of the conflict and the war continued in the Northern Territory until 1945. It is this period, spent along the North South Road, that this website attempts to document for prosperity.

Following the attacks, many camp and military sites were constructed down the Stuart highway in a military build-up designed for both defensive and offensive capabilities. As most of these sites had no known names, they were simply allocated a Mile Peg number, that being the distance from Darwin wharf along the then North South Road south to Alice Springs. To give you an example the 49 Mile point from Darwin, which was allocated to the 27th and later 28th Infantry Battalions, became known as 49 mile camp. It is this system of allocating Mile Peg Numbers that this site takes its name.

B-24 LIBERATOR MEMORIAL AUSTRALIA

HONOURING THE RAAF WW2 B-24 LIBERATOR LEGACY

B-24 RESTORATION HANGAR

Located south west of Melbourne are a few remaining hangars of what was once the Werribee airfield. Werribee was built in 1940 to serve as a training field, storage/repair base and operational location for various RAAF units. Located inside one of the few remaining hangars is the current home of the B-24 Liberator Memorial Restoration Fund organisation. The Fund is the owner of one of the only remaining B-24 bomber in the southern hemisphere and only 1 of 8 remaining B-24 airframes still existing in the world, out of the original nearly 19,000 built. After nearly 25 years since the bold vision was started, the ambitious project is getting closer to reaching the goal of preserving a B-24 Liberator to honour the contribution of one of the RAAF's main bombers of the WW2 era.

MEMORIAL GOAL - A LIVING B-24 LIBERATOR

The core aspect of the project is now focused on making the B-24 a "living bomber". It will not be flown but instead restored to a high quality as seen with other "living" warbird aircraft overseas such as the Just Jane Lancaster in the UK, which is now being upgraded to fly. The aim is for the B-24 at Werribee to be shown to the public with all elements "operational". It is hoped that the bomber will eventually be taxi-able. To enable the B-24 to "live", four working examples (and one spare backup) of the Pratt and Whitney Twin Wasp 1830 engines are to be used. These powerful and compact engines produce 1,200hp output via a two-row, 14-cylinder, air-cooled radial design. Some of the engines were donated, with one coming from an anonymous person, while two of the engines were purchased from Peter Starr of Dakota National Air. Visitors to the museum can see these engines up close and listen to the sounds via monthly engine running sessions. The hangar is also home to working displays which allow visitors to see how the aircraft systems worked. Visitors can examine up close and watch how the defensive protection of the B-24 worked. The protective fire came from many of its M2 0.5inch /12.7mm machine guns located around the airframe such as in the nose, the upper fuselage, the lower fuselage, the waist of the fuselage and the tail position. The volunteers are rebuilding all of these turrets with inert machine guns, to fit into the airframe and have some turrets already working as ground based displays to enable visitors to look closely at how the turrets operated with a crew member in them. The B-24 Liberator Memorial Restoration Fund is a great example of what can be achieved by a team of passionate, dedicated and organised volunteers. The project funding and ongoing work has mainly relied on the goodwill of volunteers, visitors and public donations to advance from where it was in the 1990s to the present day.


MUSEUM EXPANSION PLANS

The B-24 Fund has developed a strategic and detailed future plan for the ongoing preservation of its collection. It is hoping to keep and upgrade the current hangar, which will also see on display a replica WW2 era Tiger Moth, Oxford aircraft and an Anson trainer. These aircraft types were mainly made from fabric/wood/steel, so they will require extensive work. A CAC Boomerang fighter project could also be donated by its owner to the museum for public display in the future.
