A breathtaking avenue lined with live oaks leads to the tabby ruins of Wormsloe, the colonial estate constructed by Noble Jones, one of Georgia's first settlers. Jones was an English physician and carpenter who carved out an even wider career in the colonial wilderness. He came to Savannah with James Oglethorpe in 1733 and commanded a company of Marines charged with Georgia's coastal defense. Jones served as constable, Indian agent, surveyor (laying out New Ebenezer and Augusta) and member of the Royal Council. He was also one of few original settlers to survive hunger, plague, Indians, Spaniards and a new environment.

The tabby ruins on the Isle of Hope remind us of the dreams and lives of British colonists who settled Georgia. Today, visitors can view artifacts excavated at Wormsloe and a film about the founding of the 13th colony. A scenic nature trail leads to the living history area where, during special programs, costumed staff show skills and crafts necessary to early settlers. During early February of each year, the site hosts "Colonial Faire and Muster" highlighting 18th century life, military drills, craft demonstrations, music and dance.

When the Continental Congress convened in 1776, the delegates recognized the importance of a fort to protect their growing seaport from the British. Soon afterwards, a low bluff on the Medway River at Sunbury was fortified and garrisoned by 200 patriots. When the British demanded the fort's surrender on November 25, 1778, the defiant Col. John McIntosh replied, "Come and take it!" The British refused and withdrew back to Florida. Forty-five days later, they returned with a superior force, and on January 9, 1779, Fort Morris fell after a short but heavy bombardment. Under the name of Fort Defiance, this bulwark was once again used against the British during the War of 1812. Today, visitors can stand within the earthwork remains and view scenic Saint Catherines Sound. A museum and film describe the colonial port of Sunbury and the site's history. Schools and group tours are welcome with advance notice.

HOW TO GET HERE:

To visit Fort Pulaski National Monument, follow U.S. 80 East toward Tybee Island. The Monument entrance is located approximately 15 miles east of Savannah.

MONUMENT FEATURES:

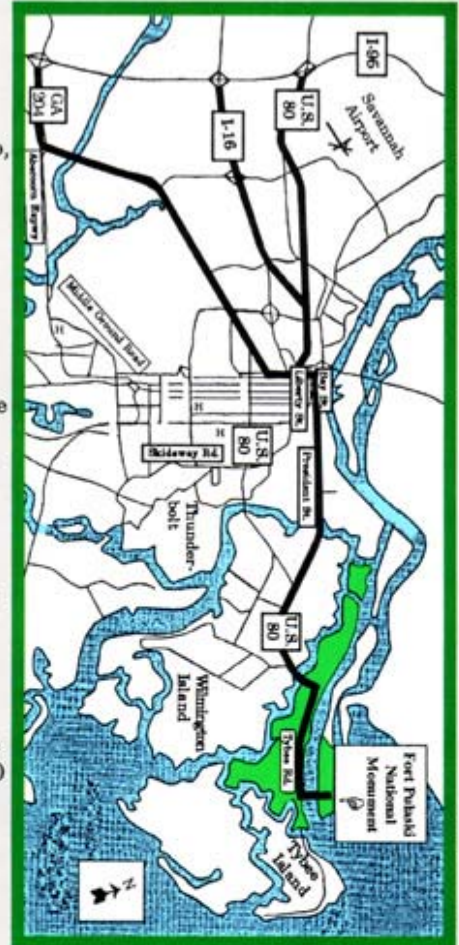
The Monument offers an introductory video, exhibits and a bookstore. Park Rangers are on duty to answer your questions.

The fort is a remarkably well-preserved example of 19th century military architecture. Located at the mouth of the Savannah River, Fort Pulaski provides views of the Atlantic Ocean as well as scenic salt marshes which cover much of the Monument's 5,600 acres.

Audiostations within the fort offer brief explanations of the history and

significance of the area. At certain times of the year, special programs are conducted.

The Monument also provides other recreational opportunities. Nature trails, a picnic area and a boat launching ramp are available. Most facilities are accessible. Please inquire at the visitor center.

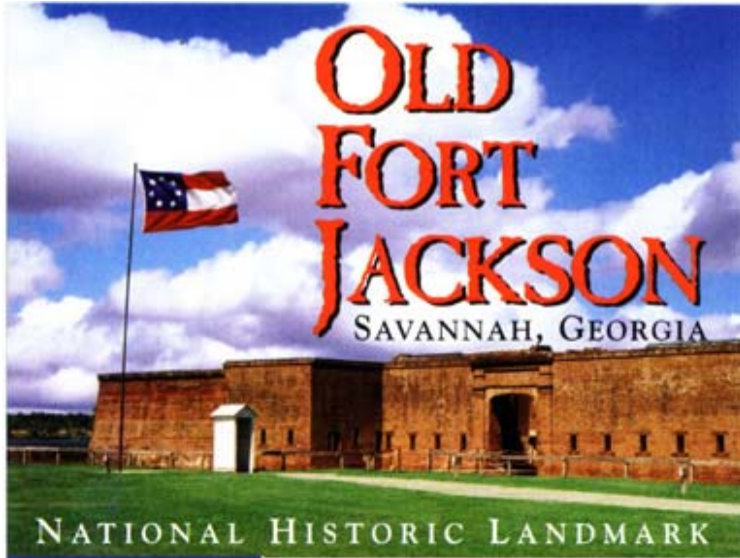

Standing on a site that has been in use since the 1740s, Fort Jackson possesses a rich history relating to the defense of Savannah through the end of the 19th century.



Fort Jackson, January 21, 1865

Old Fort Jackson is Georgia's oldest brick fortification and a National Historic Landmark. Begun by skilled craftsmen in 1808, the fort is named after Revolutionary War officer and Georgia governor James Jackson. Fort Jackson rose to prominence as the headquarters of Savannah's river defenses during the Civil War.

Today you can join the thousands of visitors following in the footsteps of General Robert E. Lee, who visited Fort Jackson early in the war.

A visit to Old Fort Jackson is a trip back in time. Walk through the old casemates and see our displays of muskets, ammunition, and exhibits from the wreck of the Civil War ironclad CSS *Georgia*. Stroll atop the parapet and stand behind our original 32-pounder and 9-inch Dahlgren cannons, taking in the same sweeping Savannah River views enjoyed by gun crews nearly a century and a half ago. Old Fort Jackson is the perfect setting for your history-themed banquet, reception, or event. We also offer living history programs tailored to the needs of Scout, student, and tour groups.

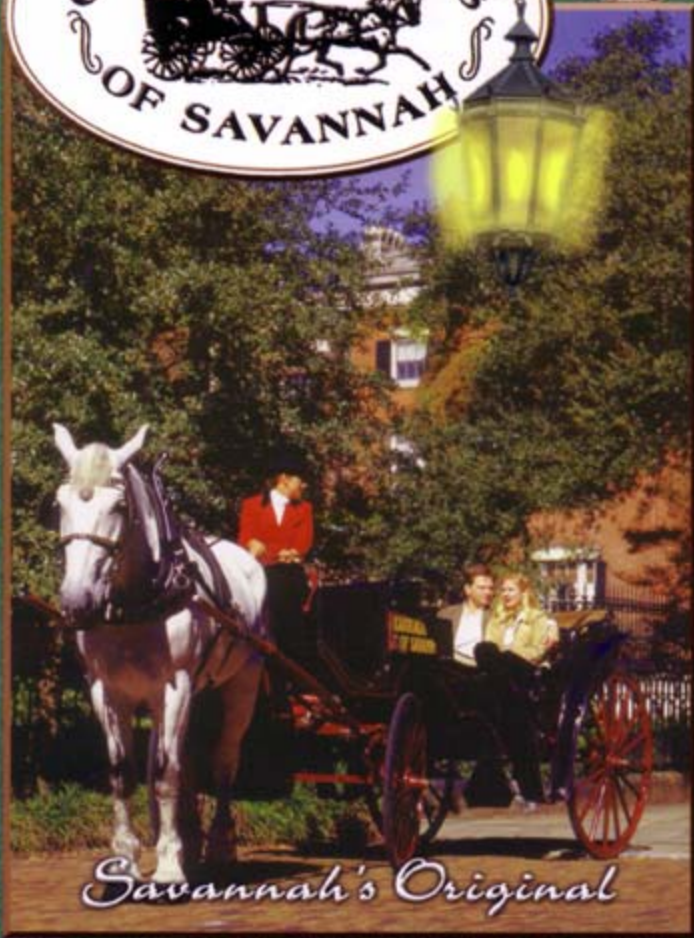

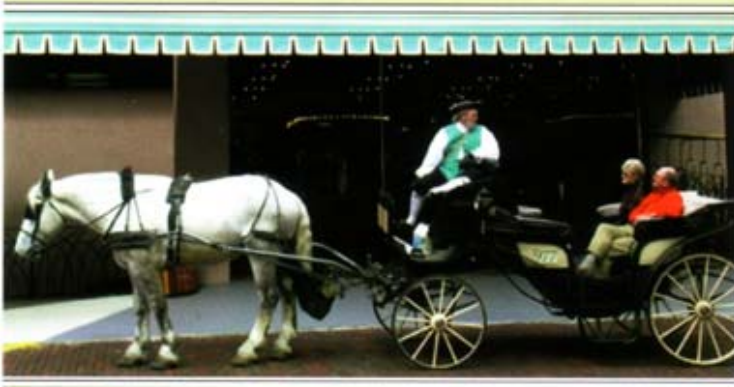

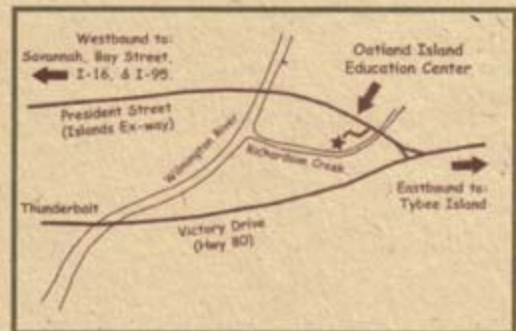
Our 1 - 3/4 mile

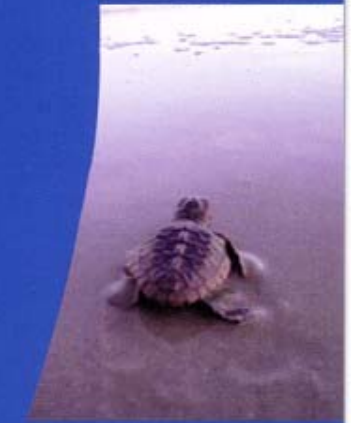
